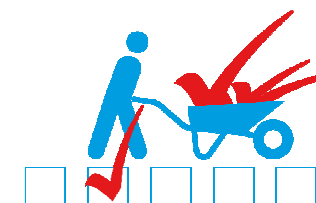
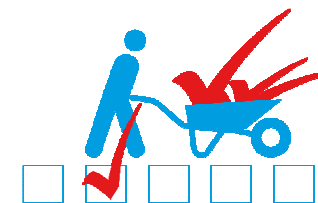


# Self-Sufficiency-Matrix 2013

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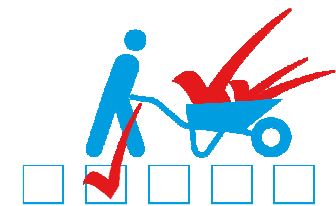

<b>Finances</b>	No income. High and increasing debts.	Inadequate income and/or spontaneous or inappropriate spending. Increasing debts.	Can meet basic needs with income and/or appropriate spending. <b>Mental health</b>	Danger to self or others and/or recurring suicidal ideation. Experiences serious difficulties in day-to-day life due to mental disorder. <b>Physical care</b>	The physical safety of child(ren) is at direct risk due to physical abuse or neglect of basic physical care and/or child had more than 3 serious accidents in the past year in or around the house.	Limitations in basic physical care, but the safety of child(ren) is not directly at risk as a result. Child had frequent (3 times in past year) accidents in or around the house. Indications of physical abuse.	No report of physical abuse or neglect. Basic physical care is usually in order. Child has several (twice in the past year) accidents in or around the house <i>and/or</i> some avoidable risk for physical safety	Basic physical care (clothes, nutrition, hygiene and medical care) are always in order. Sporadic (once in the past year) accidents in or around the house <i>and</i> no avoidable risks for physical safety,	Basic physical care is in order. <b>Schooling</b>	One or more school-age children are not registered at a school <i>and/or</i> do not attend class. Parents are not involved in the schooling of the child(ren).	One or more school-age children are regularly (2-5 times per month) absent from class without a valid reason <i>and/or</i> have limited possibilities to do schoolwork at home. Parents show minimal involvement in schooling of child(ren).
